Dunollie Museum, Castle & Grounds Update

Seasonal Opening & Winter Activities

With our first full seasonal opening since the COVID-19 pandemic almost at a close, we are pleased to have welcomed 13,958 visitors to the site so far.

These visitors are some of the first to access the first floor of Dunollie Castle since the 2019 Conservation works made it possible, as well as also being able to take advantage of the introduction of a new annual pass system. At the same cost of a day ticket, the visitor is able to visit as many times as they like over a year from the date of purchase, and for those eligible Dunollie is able to claim 25% gift aid from HMRC.

Dunollie will close to the public on the 28 October, with a series of events planned over the winter months aimed at our local families and community. This will include Halloween, Dunollie Makes Christmas, as well as garden walks at the start of 2023, to take in our magnificent display of snowdrops, daffodils, and bluebells.

Funding & Development Projects

At the end of November 2021, the National Heritage Lottery Fund awarded the Trust £114,854 from for a year-long project focused on Gardens, Links and Digital (GLAD). The project, which will cost £120,597 in total, began in March 2022. Supported through the National Lottery Heritage Fund, D unollie G LAD has concentrated on adding to and upgrading D unollie's Historic W oodland G rounds providing engaging activities for the local community, as well as family days out and activities for a younger age group and identifying and capitalising on further digital opportunities, such as QR codes. Through the grant, we were pleased to welcome two Heritage Garden Leaders under a Job share, as well as a Digital Content Assistant in February 2022. These posts will be in place for the duration of the project.

We have completed Phase I of a project to install a handrail along the Dunollie Castle Path to assist visitors in climbing the steep path. Lining the path are series of logs tethered to a wire mesh, which will provide a safety barrier and the base for a handrail constructed from wrought iron posts and rope donated by CalMac. The handrail installation will form Phase II and we hope to have this element in place for visitors by the start of the 2023 season. The initial costs of this project of £4,725 were funded through the Clan MacDougall Society of North America, and the project ensures that no excavation of the scheduled monument takes place during the installation of the handrail.
